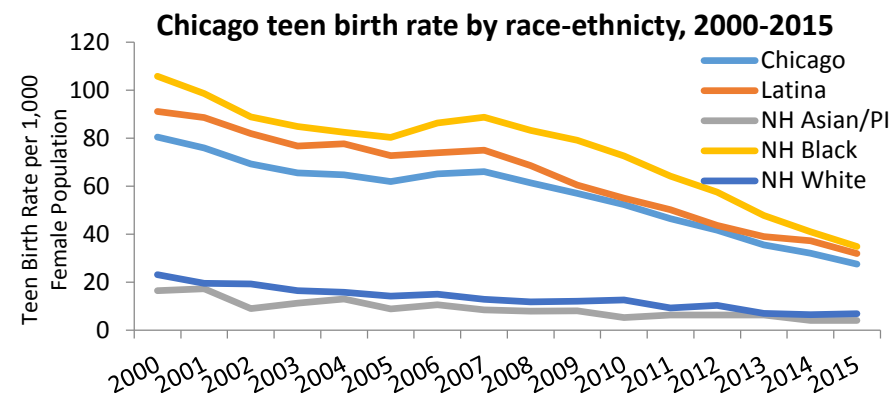
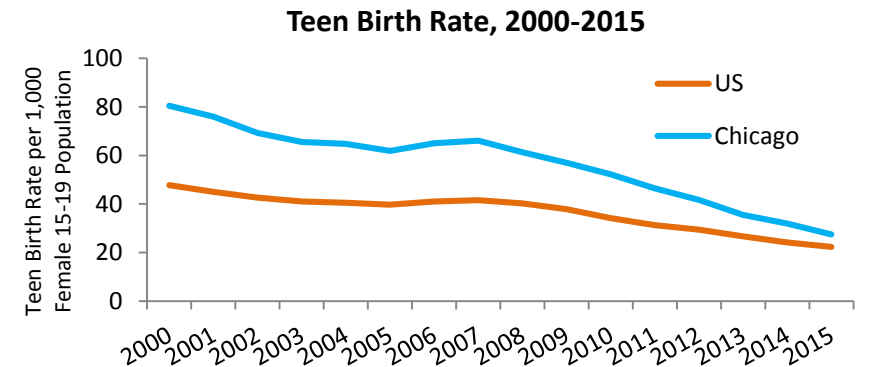


Chicago Teen Birth Rate, 2010-2015

- Definition: Number of births per 1,000 females aged 15-19
- The majority of teen births are unintended and associated with outcomes such as low birth weight and infant mortality.
- From 2010-2015, the teen birth rate declined steadily in Chicago and dropped more than the national decline in teen birth. However, Chicago's rate (27.5) is higher than the national rate (22.3) in 2015.¹
- African American teens, who historically have faced the greatest disparities, have seen the steepest decline in Chicago. Even with this progress, racial/ethnic disparities still exist. Non-Hispanic Black and Hispanic teens are around 5 times more likely to experience a birth than Non-Hispanic White teens.
